This is why we would like to dedicate the fifth volume of the *Yearbook on History and Interpretation of Phenomenology* to phenomenological reflections on education and the idea of the university, especially considering current societal and cultural movements and phenomena (e.g., the rise of nationalism and fundamentalism, the necessity of intercultural and interreligious dialogue, the refugee crisis and our forms of response, etc.). *The Center for Phenomenological Studies* at Trnava University in Trnava encourages phenomenological, critical, and interdisciplinary approaches to philosophical research on the system, current direction, and quality of Western education (including the problem of the devaluation, quantifiability, and marketing policies in the humanities) and its influences on personal and communal value orientations and its wider global effects.

The complete paper should include an English abstract (200 words), 6 keywords, contact information about the author, and citations and bibliography according to *The Chicago Manual of Style*. The contributions are published in English, French, or German language.
